EDITORIAL

After 50 days our Creek is 'Undammed'

On 14th October - 50 days after the unannounced damming of our Creek at 'The Islands' Waterhaven Estate, Point Cook, by the Hallmarc developer - the temporary soil and rock causeway was removed.

The purpose of the earth-filled causeway was to create a sewerage connection from the land development on the northern side of Skeleton Creek (next to the freeway) to the existing sewer point south of the Creek.

The developer could not bore under the Creek bed and bank area to install the sewage pipe, which would have mitigated the risk of stirring up sediment. So the sewage pipe (and two utility holes) was installed deep into the causeway, along with a 600 mm storm-water pipe.

Melbourne Water called Denice Perryman to advise of the "undamming".

Our Creek 'Undammed'

When we inspected the site on the 14th October, the removal of the causeway by earth-moving equipment had created a lot of mud. The sediment trap that was claimed to be in on "day one" was still in place yet the water downstream, where the Creek widens, opposite Catalina Crt, was a distinctive browner colour, with an assortment of soil sediment and plant-based flotsam moving around in the water and up against the Creek's banks.

The Hallmarc developer nor any of the stakeholder authorities had informed the local community or our Friends group of the damming, and it took some weeks to find out what exactly was going on there.

Eventually, on 1st October, an onsite meeting was arranged with Wyndham City Council, Melbourne Water staff to discuss the situation.

At the meeting were Denice Perryman, Secretary FoSC, Angela Whiffin, President FoSC; Cameron Howie, Manager Regional Delivery (Waterways West), Melbourne Water; Ben English, Team Leader West Region, Melbourne Water; two 'hands-on' Service Delivery employees from Melbourne Water; and Peter Gibbs, Team Leader Natural Environment, Wyndham City Council.

City West Water were to control the sewerage connection but had "not been proactive", so Melbourne Water took over responsibility during this stage of the works. The two Melbourne Water Service Delivery employees were visiting the site every two or three days, and said the Hallmarc contractor was complying with all their requests for improvement.

Native Vegetation Moved

Some native vegetation had to be moved to higher ground to protect it from being inundated by the rising upstream water caused by the damming and heavy rainfall in the area

Earlier, on 7th Sep, Denice Perryman wrote to the developer Hallmarc to make our group's displeasure known and our concerns to the likely damage to the delicate local biodiversity along the Creek. And as our Creek flows into the internationally significant Cheetham Wetlands, protected by the Ramsar Convention, this was of particular concern

Warren Keighran, Construction Manager, Hallmarc Construction replied almost straight away and said that the works had been approved and supervised by Melbourne Water and City of Wyndham, and that the works were "short-term".

Denice followed up with another letter on the 24th Sep, stressing the timely completion of the works, and "looking forward to the re-instatement of disturbed areas and fervently hoping that you will have sedimentation at the forefront of your mind as the works progresses."

Hallmarc did not reply to Denice's last letter.


FoSC have not seen any environmental impact report or any detail about the restoration work. Melbourne Water have only advised that the developer is now doing "remedial planting" in the affected parts of the Creek.

We have however been forewarned that there is another development stage requiring Creek damming upstream in a couple of years. So the stakeholder authorities are going to work on how to make the future damming "a more robust process", to meet stringent environmental and regulatory obligations in line with community expectations.

Damming Damned

On 25th Sep, a media release was sent to the local newspapers by John Dawes, Publicity Officer for FoSC. The Wyndham Star Weekly ran a story on 7th October with the headline 'Skeleton Creek Damming Damned', with a photo of Angela (previously photographed).

The Star Weekly reporter Adem Saban interviewed Angela over the phone (she says she was misquoted in parts). Overall, the article reflected what we wanted to get across – that the group was not happy at all with what the developer had done; as a matter of courtesy, local residents and our group should have been consulted and informed well before; and that we had to find out what was going on to our Creek in a roundabout way from the stakeholder authorities.



We had 13 people turn up to our activity; coincidentally, diagonally opposite the controversial Waterhaven Estate damming site. It was nice weather and Emma from Wyndham City Council came to replace Sal, who usually joins us, as he was at another activity.

We pulled out carpet weed, marshmallows and a range of other weeds. It was a good relaxed day and it was great to see locals turn up. Old hands Kaye, Wren, Peter, Bev, Tom, Greg, Angela and Denice were joined by 'newbies' Katrina Bourke and Bruce Boddington (who's happy to take photos for us if John Dawes is absent). Two passers-by came and talked to us, and we signed them up to receive our newsletters; hopefully, they may join us in future activities.

Angela noticed that the position of some of the plants affected their survival rate. Trees seemed to be beneficial to the plants in some cases - such as the she-oaks, which offered protection and cover from the prevailing winds. We shall keep this in mind for future plantings.

2016 Melbourne Water Grant for Growling Grass Frog Habitat

FoSC wish to apply for a Melbourne

Water grant to improve the habitat for the Growling Grass Frog. A suitable location selected is along Skeleton Creek at Bromage Close in Hoppers Crossing (just off Federation Trail).

To discuss the application, Angela and Denice met with Gerard Morel, River Health Officer from Melbourne Water, and from Wyndham City Council were Craig Dodson, Area Leader Conservation, Maddie Veale, Natural Environment Officer, and Darren Wright the new Community Engagement Officer Open Spaces.

There is an aquatic habitat for the frogs, but they like a range of places to hang out - so we want to plant there to give them some terrestrial habitat. We are looking at a site approx. 2 m x 70 m long.

Initially, we'd like to plant some tough, hardy native grass survivors like Lignum, Poa, Carex, Themeda and Atriplex.

Our hope is to get the Melbourne Water grant, as we did last year, and that Wyndham City Council will support our application.

[Postscript: after many hours working on the grant application, Denice has finally sent it off. So well done Denice, and we look forward to a successful outcome from your dedicated labours for Skeleton Creek ... and our local Growling Grass Frog!]

Cunningham's Skink Poaching

Craig Dodson, Area Leader Conservation from Wyndham City Council has had reports (and seen photographs) of poaching of Cunning-



ham's Skink from Skeleton Creek. The skink seems to have disappeared from Kororoit Creek, but are still seen at Lollipop Creek and Skeleton Creek; although the Skeleton Creek habitat has become fragmented.

Apparently, large rocks have been moved to steal the Cunningham's Skink, with indications that a number of people have been involved in this illegal removal. Unfortunately, the responsible staff member from the Department of Environment, Land, Water & Planning has been on holidays, which has made policing difficult.

Craig had a meeting of interested parties on 16th Oct to come up with strategies and a plan of action. Our group was involved. A meeting of local residents is planned to be held on Saturday 24th October, so Craig can provide information and to ask for help. General signage may also be used. It is to be hoped we can get on top of the problem before it's too late.

* Cunningham's Skink is a sun-loving, large skink species native to southeastern Australia. It can reach up to 400 mm in length, and may be confused with blue-tongued lizards. The species is named in honour of Alan Cunningham, explorer and botanist.
